

#### **Tobacco Center of Regulatory Science 2014 Pilot Program**

The Yale Tobacco Center of Regulatory Science (TCORS) is offering funding for pilot projects to initiate research relating to understanding tobacco additives and modified risk tobacco products through behavioral, molecular, laboratory, pharmacological, epidemiological, and economic sciences that involves humans (both clinical & epidemiological research) and animals (basic research). We are particularly interested in studies of menthol, flavors, and ecigarettes and studies using novel techniques.

Up to 5 pilot projects will be funded at the level of \$25,000 to \$100,000 (direct costs only), with higher levels of funding available for projects that incorporate more expensive technologies (such as neuroimaging). The project must be completed in 1 budget year.

While no one is a stranger to the violence that occurs in the New Haven area, perhaps no one knows the impact it has on families and the community better than Nakia Dawson, Clinical Secretary for The Palliative Care Service at Smilow Cancer Hospital.

In addition to her role as Clinical Secretary for Palliative Care, she is founder of The Bereavement Care Network (BCN), a network that reaches out to the families of homicide victims in New Haven. A lifelong resident of New Haven, Nakia's passion comes from a family member and close friend that were both victims of homicide.



Many families do not have the money to pay for funeral costs, as they may not have life insurance and the deaths are unexpected. BCN reaches out to these families to help pay for funerals, or other arrangements that are needed. The staff of six also provides families with emotional support and connections to various resources. Most of the money comes from fundraisers, or out of pocket. They also have a partnership with McClam Funeral Home, since they arrange funerals for 80% of the homicide deaths in New Haven.

"I have been where these families are and have felt what they feel. After serving as a bereavement coordinator with another organization, I knew that there was a greater need out there and that I needed to do more to help these families," said Nakia.

In her role with The Palliative Care Service at Smilow Cancer Hospital, Nakia handles new patient referrals, setting up appointments for patients, and making sure they receive their prescriptions. She sees patients come in with varying stages of disease, and cancers. The service, directed by Jennifer Kapo, MD, focuses on symptom management and quality of life issues for adult patients with serious chronic, progressive or terminal illnesses. Nakia explained that her work with BCN and the Palliative Care Service are intertwined. They both can deal with heartbreaking loss,

I am thrilled that she is part of our team."
